

Cenozoic Mammals Of Africa

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Cenozoic life was affected significantly by a major extinction event that occurred between 10,000 and 8,000 years ago. This event, which involved the sudden disappearance of many mammals after the most recent Ice Age, has been attributed to either of two factors: climatic change following the melting of the most recent Pleistocene glaciers or overkill by Paleolithic hunters.

Prehistoric Life During the Pliocene Epoch

Opossums. Opossums (order Didelphimorphia), the largest group of American marsupials, are of limited diversity in the Caribbean. The large opossum *Didelphis marsupialis* is found on Trinidad and Tobago and in the Windward Islands up to Dominica, being found on Martinique, Saint Lucia, Saint

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Vincent, Grenada, and the Grenadines of Carriacou, Mustique, and Bequia.
