Most hospitals and emergency physicians understand that COBRA, the federal law also known as the Emergency Medical Treatment and Active Labor Act (EMTALA), requires them to screen all persons who present to the emergency department (ED) to determine whether an emergency medical condition (EMC) exists. 2 Less well-understood, and much more controversial, are the required procedural elements of the medical screening examination (MSE), particularly the extent or scope that the screening must ...

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The federal Emergency Medical Treatment and Labor Act (EMTALA) requires an initial medical screening examination to determine if a true medical emergency exists; in the case of a pregnant woman, this includes evaluation of the woman and the fetus.

Emergency Medical Treatment & Labor Act (EMTALA) | CMS

The Emergency Medical Treatment and Labor Act (EMTALA) requires hospitals with emergency departments to provide a medical screening examination to any individual who comes to the emergency department and requests such an examination, and prohibits hospitals with emergency departments from refusing to examine or treat individuals with an emergency medical condition.

Hospital-Based Triage of Obstetric Patients - ACOG

Section 1867 of the Social Security Act imposes specific obligations on Medicare-participating hospitals that offer emergency services to provide a medical screening examination (MSE) when a request is made for examination or treatment for an emergency medical condition (EMC), including active labor, regardless of an individual's ability to pay.

EMTALA Considerations for Triage - The Sullivan Group

EMTALA still applies. You must still register the patient and have an licensed independent practitioner perform a medical screening exam before you have EMS take the patient elsewhere. What if the patient shows up to the ED, has no medical complaint or request whatsoever, is very well-appearing, and only wants a sandwich or a place to sleep?

EMTALA: SCREENING, STABILIZATION AND TRANSFER

EMTALA clearly requires an examination ("medical screening examination") to determine the stage of labor, in order to make the determination of whether the patient has reached the level at which a safe transfer cannot be effectuated.

No. 1 EMTALA mistake: Confusing triage and MSE | 2004-11 ...

While a plain reading of this paragraph and an interpretation of the phrase "appropriate medical screening examination" could lead one to conclude that EMTALA was intended to impose a standard on hospital emergency departments that is co-extensive or similar to the standard of care imposed by state malpractice law, courts have almost uniformly rejected this approach.

EMTALA itself allows RN's to do the medical screening exam. However the facility needs to have specific policies and procedures in place. Any time you impliment new policies and procedures, there should be some form of education and training to accompany it.

FAQ on EMTALA

To avoid violations of EMTALA, you must do the following: Read the law. Educate yourself on the definition and requirements of the MSE under EMTALA, and review your medical screening practices accordingly, says Cohen. "Read an actual copy of the federal law and learn the difference between triage and a medical screening examination.

Certification and Compliance For The Emergency Medical ...

Because CMS says that this must be formally determined, we have found it best to specifically state in the bylaws or rules and regulations who can perform a medical screening exam by title, instead of just referencing a P&P. EMTALA: The Bare Bones. The EMTALA law defined a specific process with which hospital emergency departments must conform, or risk being found in violation. Briefly, the process includes the requirement to provide a medical screening examination (MSE) to determine if the patient has an emergency medical condition (EMC).

Medical Screening Examination The medical screening examination required by EMTALA may be conducted by a physician or by qualified medical personnel. A qualified medical personnel is an individual...

FAQ: Who can conduct a Medical Screening Examination?

What level of care is required by EMTALA? Essentially, any patient who enters the emergency room of a hospital and requests an examination for a medical condition must be provided with a screening exam to determine whether or not he or she has an emergency medical condition.
