Polysemy (/ p ə ' l i s i m i / or / ' p ɒ l i s i : m i /; from Greek: πολύ-, πολύ-, "many" and σῆμα, sêma, "sign") is the capacity for a word or phrase to have multiple meanings, usually related by contiguity of meaning within a semantic field. Polysemy is thus distinct from homonymy—or homophony—which is an accidental similarity between two words (such as bear the animal, and the verb to bear); while homonymy is often a mere linguistic coincidence ...
